Through the great outdoors and the brotherhood of being military veterans, our heroes' mission is to find a sense of healing as they struggle with transition to civilian life...and to know they are not alone.

It began with fundraising. We needed a minimum of \$3,000 to fly 3 heroes to Wisconsin and buy their hunting and fishing licenses. Through the efforts of many the

Often they come home with physical injuries, but more often there are injuries that we cannot see. Very often it is the unseen injury that leads to a tragic ending of suicide. Twenty two combat veterans per day commit suicide. If our community in central Bayfield County can provide a place of healing to prevent one or more suicides, then we need to do it.
