Inaugural Alabama Turkey & Hog Hunt

March 30 - April 3 Boaz, AL



The residents and businesses of Boaz, Alabama proudly welcomed four of our combat-wounded Warriors for the Inaugural Alabama Turkey and Hog Hunt. Once our Heroes arrived, they enjoyed a wonderful lunch at Baumhower's Victory Grille while getting to know their Host and one other. After lunch, our Heroes were given a special surprise as they treated to a personal tour of the University of Alabama football practice facility, courtesy of Marine veteran, Evan Van Nostrand, a two-time Purple Heart recipient and one of the University's athletic trainers. Everyone was grateful for the behind the scenes look at one of the nation's premiere football programs, and were amazed at the tradition, technology, and the overall logistics involved. It was a great bonding experience and an awesome way to kick off this event!

Later that afternoon, our Heroes arrived at their hunting camp, which was wonderfully appointed and perfect for a relaxing few days in the Alabama countryside. Once they were settled in, they were each gifted with a 12-gauge shotgun laser-engraved with the WWIA logo as well as a sling, sight, and an extended choke tube. They were also graciously presented with handmade diaphragm mouth calls and glass pot calls embossed with the WWIA logo. It was an incredible gesture that our Heroes were truly humbled by. Soon afterwards, everyone headed outside and patterned their shotguns in preparation for the upcoming hunt. The hunting camp owner and the event guides showed up just after dark to get acquainted with everyone and to discuss the upcoming hunts.

The next morning, everyone awoke full of anticipation and excitement as they hit the fields in search of turkeys. The hunt went well with everyone making contact with gobblers and getting in some practice with their new custom-made calls. After a long day in the field, everyone returned to get cleaned up and headed out for a delicious steak dinner while sharing stories and laughs as they prepared for another great day of hunting.

As our Heroes arose the next day, heavy thunderstorms and winds moved in, so there was some additional time to rest and relax. As the weather cleared, everyone headed out a few hours after sunrise. A short time later, Hero Joseph was able to connect on a nice turkey with a 10 inch beard and 1 3/8 inch spurs. Hero Dan was also able to harvest a 125lb sow. Later that afternoon, the sow was processed and tenderloins and back straps were used to make an awesome appetizer for that evening's dinner. Dinner consisted of hand-cut french fries and homemade burgers as the Heroes, Host, and their local guides had a wonderful time of fellowship, enjoying the company and conversation, and sharing their gratitude for the past few days spent together.

On the final day of the event, everyone hit the fields again and although they could hear gobblers, they simply couldn't close the distance as the birds were gobbling from the roost and weren't being responsive to calls. Nonetheless, everyone enjoyed themselves and the group decided to head back to start packing up their gear, and to clean up the buggies and the camp. Everyone then got ready for the final evening banquet held at the Alabama Firearms Academy in Boaz. Our Heroes were honored by over 100 members of the community who expressed their gratitude and appreciation for our combat-wounded Warriors. They were treated to an outstanding meal of steak, twice-baked potatoes, homemade pork rinds, and homemade ice cream courtesy of Rob Dempsey of Dempsey Family BBQ. WWIA Founder and CEO, John McDaniel was also present and briefly spoke to those in attendance, sharing the mission of WWIA and thanking everyone for their patriotism and support. Our Heroes were also graciously presented

with an official resolution from the <u>Alabama House of Representatives</u>, written by Representatives <u>Brock Colvin</u> and <u>Wes Kitchens</u> that formally honored each Hero for their tremendous service and sacrifice on behalf of our country. It was a touching tribute that our Heroes were truly grateful for. After a phenomenal banquet dinner, everyone returned to camp and gathered around a fire to share their thoughts and experiences over the past four days before turning in for a good night's rest. As we talked before we departed, I'd love to be a part of WWIA in any fashion. If it's becoming a guide or simply just cooking at an event, it would be an honor. 




